1. Introduction : The Philosophy of Sport

* Sport is more than just a game – it's a cultural and social phenomenon that shapes identity, community and emotions

Key question: What makes supporting a football team meaningful, even when it seems irrational?

2. Philosophical connections

A. Loyalty and Identity

* Philosophers: Bernard Williams & Alasdair Macintyre

* Williams argues that deep commitments – like supporting a team – are part of our personal identify, beyond pure rational calculation

* Macintyre speaks of "practices" that build community and tradition, where sport creates a sense of belonging

Discussion prompt: Is supporting a team part of your moral and social identity, even when it's not rational?

B. Absurdity and Meaning

* Philosophers: Albert Camus & Thomas Nagel

* Camus, who was a footballer himself, wrote about absurdity – the conflict between our search for meaning and the universe's indifference

* Nagel explores the Absurd as the clash between our passionate commitment to things like sport and the understanding that they may not matter

Discussion prompt: Is being a football fan a way to embrace absurdity meaningfully?

C. Collective emotion and belonging

* Philosophers: Emile Durkheim & Jurgen Habermas

* Durkheim's idea of collective effervescence describes the intense energy and unity felt during shared events, like football matches

* Habermas emphasises the role of public spaces ()like stadiums) in shaping community and identify

Discussion prompt: Is the emotional surge of a live match rational, or purely emotional?

D. Rationality and Irrationality

* Philosophers: David Hume & William James

* Hume argues that reason is the slave of the passions-our emotions often drive our actions more than logic

* William James in the Will to Believe, justifies belief in things that bring joy or community, even if irrational.

Discussion prompt: If football fandom brings happiness and community, does it need to be rational?

3. Key questions for reflection

- i. Does loyalty to a losing team make sense?
- ii. Can you rationally justify the emotional investment in football?
- iii. Is supporting a team akin to belonging to a religion or cult?
- iv. Cn a football supporter be both rational and irrational at the same time?
